EARLY INTERVENTION MAKES A DIFFERENCE



What is Early Intervention?

Early Intervention is a program for children under the age of 3 that are demonstrating developmental concerns. If your child is not crawling, walking, or speaking at the appropriate chronological times, you can contact Early Intervention. A case coordinator will be in touch with you to discuss your concerns and discuss having your child evaluated. If your child is found to be eligible for services, Early Intervention provides the following therapies:

Developmental Instruction (DI) - A DI's job is to create learning activities that promote the child's acquisition of skills in a variety of developmental areas. DI therapists do not address one specific area of functioning but instead try to promote all skills including: cognition, language and communication, social-emotional functioning and behavior, gross and fine motor skills as well as self-help skills via play based interactions as well as environmental modifications. In other words a DIs are a bit like a "jacks of all trades" and they focus on a little bit of everything.

Occupational Therapy (OT) - Occupational therapists focus on developing fine motor skills so children can grasp and release toys and develop good handwriting skill, improving eye–hand coordination, and mastering basic life skills such as getting dressed, brushing teeth, and self-feeding.

Physical Therapy (PT) - Physical therapists help children learn to crawl so they can move from place to place, learn to sit so they can play on the floor, improve balance so they can walk without falling, get stronger so they can keep up with their friends, and hold, explore, and play with toys of different sizes, shapes, and weights.

Speech Therapy - Unlike DIs, pediatric speech language therapists (SLP's) focus on and have an in-depth specialization in improving children's communication skills. SLP's focus on developing children's receptive and expressive communication.

What happens once my student ages out of Early Intervention at age 3?

Shortly before your child turns 3, Early Intervention will notify the school district that you reside in that your child will be aging out. Once the school district receives this notification, a meeting will be scheduled with the school's Child Study Team (CST) to discuss the concerns about your child and whether it is felt that he/she needs to be evaluated. If it is decided he/she is evaluated and found to be eligible for special education, your child can receive special education and related services in school such as speech therapy, physical therapy, and occupational therapy. These things are all timed to happen so that a program at the school can be in place for when your child turns 3 to prevent any lapses in services.

I&RS in a Snapshot (INTERVENE EARLY)

I&RS stands for Intervention and Referral Services. School districts are required to establish and implement interventions, designed to assist students who are experiencing significant learning or behavioral difficulties in the general education program.

The I&RS committee can be made up of any combination of teachers, related service providers, the school Principal, basic skills teachers, CST members, and/or school counselor.

An I&RS program can target its resources to the identification and amelioration of problems at the earliest possible stages.

They can assist by addressing both academic and social/emotional concerns of individual students including:

-Recommendations

-Interventions/strategies

-Materials/resources

A specific, written plan of action is put into place to be implemented and reviewed at specific times.

Parents/guardians are included in the process and are considered implementers of selected strategies contained in the I&RS action plan.

Specific goals are defined for student improvement and monitored through data collections on an ongoing basis to determine progress.
