- Increasing and improving the integration of technology as well as supporting distance learning if and when needed
- Enhancing building and campus security
- Promoting and ensuring the health and well being as well as the safety of both students and staff for in-person learning
- Ensuring academic growth and remediation for all students






Revenue Budget Comparison

2021-22 \$11,324,401








Budgetary Per Pupil Cost Comparison

Staffing Needs Addressed in Upcoming Budget

- Staffing Needs
 - Expand Lincoln Guidance Counselor from 80% to Full time
 - ➤ Upgrade C&I Supervisor to a 12 month Director's position
 - ➤ Create a new position "Assistant to Buildings & Ground Supervisor" to assist with facilities and referendum projects and work
 - ➤ Enter a shared services agreement for Clinical services to support students & their families
 - ➤ Add a Special Services Consultant to supplement Special Education Programming
 - ➤ Negotiated increase in staff salaries for 2021-2024 contract
- Continuation of all Special Education Programs
 - ➤ Ongoing reduction of out-of-district placements
 - ➤ Increasing more tuition students when possible
 - ➤OT, PT and Speech therapies provided when eligible



Programming Needs Addressed in Budget

- Continuation of existing programs and ongoing updates of curricula and resources
 - ➤ WIN (What I Need) Intervention Program
 - ➤ Reader's and Writer's Workshop for K-6
 - ➤ Phonics First
 - > Reading Recovery & Leveled Literacy Intervention (LLI)
 - > ST Math to include 1st through 6th grades
 - > Renaissance—STAR and Accelerated Reader for targeted Special Ed classes
 - ➤ IXL Diagnostic Tool & Practice
 - ➤ Link-it! Benchmark and Data services for the entire district
 - ➤ Myon Digital Library through Renaissance for students of all levels
 - > ALEKS online math program to support our middle school students
 - ➤ Learning Ally Dyslexia platform for targeted students
 - Orton Gillingham Training for targeted teachers (Federal funding)
 - ➤ Materials to support instruction regarding LGBQT & Persons with Disabilities curriculum
 - ➤ Addition of Social Emotional Learning (SEL) to all facets of curriculum such as Responsive Classroom training for Lincoln School staff



Technology Concerns Addressed

- Expansion of Technology Based Initiatives
 - Continued support for 1:1 Initiative for all students PreK-8. Will continue with current initiative established during the pandemic.

Grades Preschool-8th: Take home devices to facilitate virtual learning for all students

Additional technology equipment such as document cameras, amplifiers, headphones, etc. to support all phases of our 1:1 initiative

- Equipment and Services
 - Additional and replacement Chromebooks to support 1:1 for all students
 - ➤ Upkeep and continued replacement of Smartboards in targeted rooms plus new Smartboards for the new classrooms at Lincoln
 - ➤ Maintenance of all teacher and staff laptops
 - ➤ Replace and upgrade all internet switches district wide




Security and Safety Enhancements

- Maintenance, upgrades & repairs to enhance both safety & security in both schools, inside and out
 - ➤ Maintain Part-Time Class III Office
 - ➤ Replace the ADA chair lift at Lincoln
 - ➤ Continue with targeted building renovations and additions already scheduled and financed through Referendum

Other possible proposed facilities projects scheduled for the Summer of 2022 include the following:

- > Repave the Lincoln blacktop and parking lots
- > Expand and repave the front driveway circle/drop-off lane at Thomas Jefferson
- ➤ Purchase new Back up Natural Gas Generators for both buildings
- ➤ Replace and Upgrade front sign to Electronic/LED at Thomas Jefferson
